

Turning production "waste" into a resource


- Optimising resource usage and reducing the amount of virgin resources we need
- Creating less waste that must be disposed of through incineration or landfill, both of which pollute the environment
- Reducing costs in terms of raw materials and disposal of waste





Making usage more circular


- More sustainable practices would imply moving away from the constant
- Production of new goods which are used a limited number of times before being discarded.
- This might involve reconsidering how fishing and aquaculture equipment and machinery are used.





Recycling of materials at the end of a product's life

Increasing our ability, capacity and motivation to recycle is a fundamental part of building a circular economy that transforms and adds value to such waste

What can FLAGs do:

- Awareness raising campaigns against littering: in schools, in public places (including touristic)
- Awareness raising campaigns against the use of avoidable plastic items and packaging
- General beach clean-ups






Building on potential – Resources
