

Introducing participation

- Participation does not guarantee development and sustainability
- It could incur significant costs
- Participation is a responsible exercise of democracy and citizenship
 - **Emphasis in participatory interactions:**
 - o not on what experts know, but on how to distribute their knowledge
 - not on their ability to solve problems, but on opening up debate about them
 - not on public trust in their expertise, but on individual trust in their integrity,
 - o not on consent to their plans, but on consent to their mediating debate
 - Problems related to roles, power, parameters, forms of co-optation, activism, and resistance within the community create **practical ambiguities for both observers and participants**

A COST Action: Underground4value

- Funded by COST (European Cooperation in Science and Technology) in the framework of the EU Horizon programme (2019-2023)
- Challenge: Promoting UBH as a valuable resource to celebrate and preserve and, when sustainable, to re-use and valorise, realising its full potential to support local communities' development.
- How: Establishing a expert network to promote interaction with local communities, disseminate innovative thinking, and support them to explore alternative social trajectories
- 35 Countries and more than 200 members collaborating in 5 working groups, with 4 training schools and 13 living labs




- Multi-level governance circular
- Flexible and adaptable approach based on three components:
 - Strategic Stakeholders Dialogue
 (SSD) → Process-oriented
 - Transition Management (TM) →
 Goal-oriented
- Step-by-step methodology:
 - To guide local promoters
- To facilitate the dialogue between professionals and citizens
- To develop a dynamic and iterative process

Introducing the context

- Naples is characterised by a rich cultural heritage since 1995 its historic centre has been included in the UNESCO list of World Heritage Sites
- The Rione Sanità is a popular and authentic neighbourhood, which today enjoys a revival of its heritage and tourism through local projects integrating social, cultural, economic and public policy dimensions
- Despite its significance, for long time the district faced socioeconomic struggles and limited recognition of its cultural assets. It is an area defined by many as 'a ghetto in the middle of the city'
- The site's underground heritage offers a unique opportunity for community-driven revitalisation
- However, prevailing practices are not based on participation

Introducing the context





The Fontanelle Cemetery Living Lab

- o Developing a **Public Private Partnership** to ensure the conservation of the Fontanelle Cemetery and promote its public use and valorisation.
- Methodology: Strategic Transition Practice (STP) with multi-level and multi-stakeholder strategic dialogue in form of a living lab
- o Key Activities:
 - Mapping Stakeholders Local community members and leaders;
 San Gennaro Community Foundation; International experts and researchers.
 - Starting the Living Lab Interviews, bilateral meetings, dialogue sessions and workshops with the local stakeholders.
 - Deepening the knowledge Training school programs for academics and practitioners. Consultations with visiting researchers and tutors.
 - Structuring the options Supporting the Partnership agreement

Process of Mapping and Engagement




Living Lab meetings

- First meeting Participants: Municipality of Naples, Fondazione San Gennaro, Third Municipality, CNR - Results: Identification of problems and solutions through brainstorming. Main topics: general approach, management, valorisation, security.
- Second meeting Participants: Extension with technical experts (security and urban analysis) Focus: Rationalisation of ideas gathered. Definition of competences, responsibilities and necessary resources. Commitment of the municipality for security audits.
- O Third meeting Participants: New City Council managers, La Paranza Cooperative. Focus: Review of the draft management agreement. Discussion on maintenance and resources.
- o **Final workshop** *Objective*: Formalisation of the agreement and promotion of the underground heritage. *Results*: Presentation of enhancement projects. Promotional videos and reflections on sustainable management.



Lessons learned

- Expanded stakeholder mapping and engagement to include more diverse participants.
- The need for a more transparent and continuous participatory approach emerged, ensuring community involvement at all stages of the process.
- Necessary to include a broader range of perspectives to reflect also the spiritual, cultural, and scientific values of the cemetery



Main Findings and Contributions

- **New Naples' mayor and councillors**. Structural analysis of the site, declaring some areas unfit for use – site closed since March 2020.
- **Critical reflection on the agreement** Exploration of cultural, spiritual and inclusive aspects of the site.
- **Identification of gaps** in the involvement of the Rione Sanità and the city community \rightarrow Meetings with excluded key figures
- Demand for more inclusive approach to site management to strength its historical and cultural values.
- Overcoming the previous partnership agreement. Publication of a **public tender** for a special public-private partnership (October 2022) \rightarrow we organise a workshop.
- On 31 October 2023, Partnership Agreement between the Municipality and the Social Cooperative 'La Paranza' \rightarrow we publish a book and present the case at the RAI


